Training Course for Lay Funeral Ministers

Who?

The course is for lay people who have been selected by their parish priests to serve the community by leading funeral services when there is no priest or deacon available or when it is pastorally desirable for a lay person to lead a particular service.

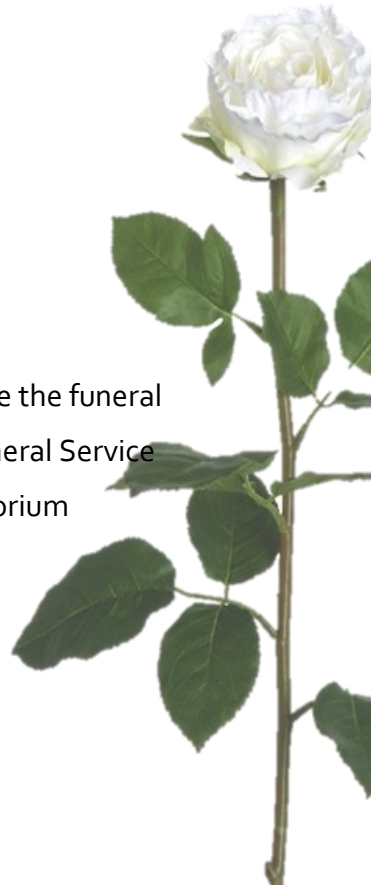
They will be individuals who:

- are sensitive to the varied feelings, experiences and needs of bereaved people
- have the confidence and skills to lead liturgical services
- are willing and able to work with others as part of a parish bereavement team, valuing the differing contributions of different ministries
- are free during the day
- have complied with the requirements of the Archdiocesan policy for safeguarding children and vulnerable adults

What?

The course will cover:

- The importance of this role
- Relating sensitively to bereaved people
- The stages of grief
- Understanding the Funeral Rites:
 - the Prayer Vigil, usually the evening before the funeral
 - the Funeral, which may be a Mass or a Funeral Service
 - the Committal at the cemetery or crematorium
- Skills for presiding at liturgical services
- Practicalities of working with undertakers
- Getting to know local practice



When?

The course will be held over two days, Tuesday 19th and Wednesday 20th November 2019, 10.00am-4.00pm. It is essential that participants are able to attend both days.

Where?

The course will take place at the Archdiocesan Conference Centre, LACE, Croxteth Drive, Sefton Park, Liverpool L17 1AA.

What happens after the course?

Before being commissioned, participants will meet with their parish priest to prepare for beginning to exercise this ministry. Once commissioned they will be provided with in-service training on a regular basis and a named course team member will offer them continuing support.

Cost

The cost will be £100 per participant. This includes lunch on both days.

Course Team

The course will be led by members of the Funerals Working Party, which includes priests, a deacon, a funeral director, a religious sister, and lay people with experience of leading funerals.

Applications are invited from parish priests who have selected candidates to be trained for this ministry.
